

Introduction

Migrations (wandering traffic, mechanical movement of the population) mean territorial activities related to a **relatively permanent change of residence**.

It is assumed that migrations are movements from one territorial unit to another for a (time not shorter than a predetermined period (usually three months).

Types of migration

Migrations are divided according to several criteria:

- the type or administrative status of the unit,
- the length of the stay in the new territorial unit,
- the legal status of the migrant,
- the primary migration motive

Migrations due to time

- permanent (definitive)
- temporal (seasonal)
- (swinging) commuting

Migrations by area

 - from the countryside to the cities,
 - from cities to villages,
 - from city to city,
 - from the countryside to the countryside

- deportation




Telemigration

A new phenomenon

In 2019 Baldwin used the term 'telemigration' to refer to individuals living in one country while working for a company based in another.







National minority and ethnic minority

Ethnic minority (in Poland)

- it is less numerous than the rest of the population of the Republic of Poland;
- differs significantly from other citizens in terms of language, culture or tradition;
- seeks to preserve its language, culture or tradition;
- is aware of its historical community and aims to express and protect it;
- her ancestors have lived in the present territory of the Republic of Poland for at least 100 years;
- does NOT identify with the nation organised in its state.

Migration analysis

Flow analysis - total numbers of migrations of specific categories in a particular calendar year.

Stock analysis - the total number of international migrants present in a given country at a particular point in time.


Pushing and pulling factors hypothesis

In 1966 Everett Lee proposed his concept of migration.

According to this concept, the propensity to migrate depends on the "pull factors at the destination and push factors (at the migrant's place of origin).

The "balance" is modified due to indirect obstacles and the individual characteristics of the migrant.

Pushing and pulling factors hypothesis



Gravity model

The theoretical concept of migration from the 1960 s constructed by E Kanr and G K Zipf.

It assumes that the size of the migration stream is directly proportional to the demographic potential of both the destination and origin unit.

It is inversely proportional to the physical distance between these units.



Definitions

Refugees have been forced to flee their countries because of persecution, war or violence.

An **asylum seeker** has left their country and is seeking protection from persecution and serious human rights violations in another country but hasn't yet been legally recognised as a refugee waiting to receive a decision on their asylum claim.

Definitions

An **internally displaced** person has been forced to flee their home but never crossed an international border.

A **stateless person** is someone who is not a citizen of any country.
